





Alain & Berny Sèbe : Drawn by the Call of the Desert

or more than 40 years, the life of Alain Sèbe has been shaped by his love for the Sahara. A professional photographer trained at the prestigious photographic school of Vevey (Switzerland), he decided to dedicate his artistic life to the largest and most beautiful desert in the world after he made his first trip there in 1966. He discovered unspoilt oases, pristine landscapes, sharp lights and bright shadows which matched his aesthetic feelings. Between the Sahara and him, it was love at first sight. He befriended Tuareg nomads or oasis-dwellers, learning their way of life, joining them in their everyday life to capture the essence of their existence. He walked endlessly in search for the best angle and light or lived with the nomads to document their traditional way of life, sensing as early as the 1970s that it was threatened by extinction. Besides organising countless month-long camel rides or vehicle-dependent expeditions, he flew over the Sahara in a private plane chartered by the Algerian government and even in balloons as the official photographer of a Jules Verne-style aeronautical trans-Saharan crossing.

Alain soon realised that 'the Sahara [had become] a way of life' for him. He sold his leading photographic lab and studio on the French Riviera, to launch his own desert-focussed publishing house in 1978. His first book Tagoulmoust, the men of the aqoulmoust Veil, soon translated into German and Italian, was an immediate success and set the trend for large format, high-quality photographic books in Europe. He went on publishing carefully crafted books at a rhythm of little less than one per year, gleaning on the way awards celebrating the quality of his work: his book Moula-Moula, the Sahara as the crow flies, published in 1982, obtained the prestigious Kodak Fotobuchpreis, while Issoulane, the Tassili mountains of the Sahara was awarded the Vasari prize by the Paris Town





Council, and Tikatoutine, 6000 years of Saharan rock art obtained the Prix Louis Castex of the French Academy.

The Sahara also weaved the thread of a unique human story for the Sèbes. During his months in the wilderness, Alain was always accompanied by his wife, Chinese-born Mitsou, and their son Berny, also known as 'The Little Prince' in his early years, a reference to his



innocent and lively silhouette when he walked on the back of sand dunes. From his first trip as a nine-month old baby, he learnt life through extended contact with the desert and its inhabitants. The Sahara became a second nature, to such an extent that he did not attend school and opted for



distance learning instead, to gain the freedom to remain constantly on the move while in Africa. Today, having taken part in more than twenty Saharan expeditions, and with a doctorate from Oxford under his belt, he is a Lecturer in Colonial and Postcolonial Studies at the University of Birmingham. Still, he


remains also an active desert photographer.

Alain and Berny combine their talent to provide one of the most extensive depictions of the variety of landscapes, peoples and historical heritage that make the Sahara one of the most fascinating places on Earth. Their archive, which covers 5,000 km from the Atlantic to the Nile along the Tropic of Cancer, includes modern depictions of the Sahara, unique aerial views, as well as rare documents about the bygone era of nomadic ways of life. Not only are their images visually striking, but they also testify an exceptional human adventure spanning more than four decades of an ever-changing desert.

Alain Sèbe

Multiple award-winning photographer Alain Sèbe graduated at the College of Applied Arts in Vevey, Switzerland, in 1961. He then set up a professional studio in Nice, France, and discovered the Sahara desert five years later under the auspices of the Algerian Ministry of Tourism. This commission started his love-affair with the Sahara which has guided his life for more than forty years now. In 1978, he sold his studio to create his own publishing house dedicated to the greatest desert of the world. He has authored some 25 photographic books on the Sahara and its inhabitants, which have sold in total several hundreds of thousands. His photographic archive, which covers Morocco, Algeria, Tunisia, Libya and Egypt, is considered the largest collection of artistic photographs on the subject. His work has been awarded prizes by Kodak Germany, the Council of Paris and the French Academy, among others.

Berny Sèbe (D.Phil Oxon., FRGS)

Berny Sèbe (b. 1978) has been associated to his father's activities since he was a baby. He took his first shots aged 8, and soon found himself addicted to his camera. His involvement in the paternal business increased to such an extent that he became closely associated to every project, while still in his early teens. Considering photography part of his heritage, he graduated in History, Geography and Literature in France, Spain and the UK. Wishing to improve his understanding of the historical roots of the Saharan countries he is in love with, he completed a doctorate in the colonial history of Africa at the University of Oxford. Besides being a photographer, he is also a Lecturer in Colonial and Postcolonial Studies at the University of Birmingham (UK).
